

METHAMPHETAMINE USE IN MONTANA

About Methamphetamine:

Methamphetamine is a powerful and addictive stimulant that affects the central nervous system. It is a Schedule II substance and there are limited medical uses as Desoxyn to treat obesity and ADHD. Use of methamphetamine may result in increased activity, talkativeness, euphoria, and decreased appetite, and can have a wide range of negative health consequences, including psychosis, cardiovascular and renal dysfunction, infectious disease transmission, addiction, and overdose.¹

Key Points:

- Methamphetamine and stimulant seizures (excluding cocaine) by law enforcement in Montana increased by 200% from 2013 to 2021. By 2023, seizures declined 20% to a total of 1,578 seizures.² For comparison, there were 82 opioid seizures in 2023.
- In 2023, methamphetamine was identified in 48% of drug overdose deaths in Montana (89 of 185 drug overdose deaths).³
- \$53.5 million were charged by hospitals across the state to treat nearly 3,800
 patients for methamphetamine overdose and other stimulant-related disorders in
 2023.4
- Methamphetamine was the second most common drug (not including alcohol) found in impaired driver blood samples - after cannabis. Methamphetamine was found in 24% of impaired driver blood samples that were tested for drugs.⁵
