

Medicaid coverage loss Special Enrollment Period extended through November 30, 2024


The end of 12-month continuous eligibility for many Medicaid populations

Enhanced affordability provisions on the Health Insurance Marketplace


Medicaid expansion set to sunset in June 2025, unless Legislature acts

## MT Medicaid Expansion Timeline



#### 2010

Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act passes Congress.



#### 2013

First legislative attempt in Montana to expand Medicaid fails by 1 vote.



#### 2019

House Bill 658 reauthorized the HELP Act through June 2025.

U.S. Supreme Court rules that states cannot be mandated to expand Medicaid, now optional for state participation.



Senate Bill 405 (HELP Act – Health and Economic Livelihood Partnership), initially approved through June 2019.



HB 658 expires June 30, 2025. The 2025 Legislature will be tasked with determining whether the state continues coverage for low-income adults.

Health and Economic Livelihood Partnership (HELP) Act,

• Included premiums for some participants Was scheduled to sunset in 2019



2019

Montana renewed Medicaid expansion

- Included work reporting requirements, but these were never approved.
- In 2021, CMS ended Montana's authority to charge premiums.
- Is scheduled to sunset in 2025





## Expanded Medicaid keeps Montanans healthy

61,000 preventative care services in 2021

34,000 mental health services

5,500 received treatment for substance use disorders.

Other services: cancer, diabetes, and hypertension screenings

Better self-reported health

Fewer premature deaths

## Expanded Medicaid keeps health care accessible

With expansion, SUD funding grew from \$5.1million to \$24.3 million

After expansion, the number of SUD providers grew from 95 to 208

Since expansion, no Montana hospitals have closed

# Expanded Medicaid improves access (and health) in tribal communities


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The United States has trust and treaty obligations to American Indians, including providing health care. Because these have never been fully met, health care access in Indian Country is underfunded.

The Indian Health Service (IHS) receives a set amount of funding for certain services. Medicaid expansion has allowed IHS facilities to bill Medicaid for some of these services (at no cost to the state), freeing up funds to offer better care.

Since expansion, seven Tribal Nations were able to expand their services to providing more preventative care, including prenatal care, mammograms, and colonoscopies.





Medicaid expansion increases access to preventive services and behavioral health treatment for American Indians.

10,700 | 4,600 | 1,400 | substance use

In 2022, more than **10,700 people accessed preventive services** (17% more than the year prior).

Also, more than **4,600 people received mental health care**, and more than **1,400 received substance use disorder treatment**.

### Expanded Medicaid keeps the state budget healthy



Montana pays 10% of the cost of expanded Medicaid

In 2022, Montana saved an estimated \$27 million dollars


Expanded Medicaid draws down federal funds = economic activity, jobs, and state tax revenue

Expanded Medicaid keeps the state budget healthy

#### **Control Health Care Costs**



The proportion of state general fund spending on Medicaid has remained stable since before Montana expanded Medicaid.

Medicaid has **consistently accounted for about 13% of Montana's state general fund** spending since 2015, the year before Medicaid expansion was implemented.



\$28 million state budget savings

18% decrease emergency & inpatient costs

Medicaid expansion has made new federal dollars available to supplement Montana's existing Medicaid funding, helping generate state budget savings.

- Implementing Medicaid expansion generated more than \$28 million in state budget savings.
- By the third year, average emergency and inpatient costs declined over 18% per enrollee.

# Montana's Recent Mental Health Policies Depend on Medicaid Expansion for Success



The governor's HEART
Initiative allows Medicaid
to cover new treatment
for methamphetamine
use and address housing
needs for people with
serious mental illness
and substance use.

HB 872 (2023) allocated \$300 million to build a "Behavioral Health System for Future Generations." Many of the programs funded will require Medicaid reimbursement to be financially viable.

Also in 2023, the State Legislature increased reimbursement for behavioral health to help Montana fix its longstanding workforce shortages and recruit and retain high-quality providers. Those reimbursement rates depend on patients having Medicaid coverage through Medicaid expansion.





#### Continue Montana's Current Medicaid Program

In 2015, Montana raised Medicaid eligibility for adults to 138 percent of the federal poverty line. The Legislature must vote to continue Montana's current Medicaid program in 2025, or thousands of Montanans risk losing their health insurance.



## Impacts of Medicaid Unwinding

Children and other vulnerable groups have been significantly impacted

 Montana had the highest disenrollment rate for children of 15% fewer children covered than pre-pandemic with 30,000 kids disenrolled. – Georgetown University Center for Children and Families

Medicaid case issues are creating additional barriers for other public benefits




Ongoing case processing delays

• 45% of all new MAGI Medicaid applications were not being processed within 45 days as of March 2024 – DPHHS Medicaid Unwind Data Report, June 2024



## How to apply for Medicaid


- In-person at an Office of Public Assistance
- Via phone on the Public Assistance Helpline or Cover MT Helpline
- Paper application dropped off or faxed to the OPA
- Online
  - State Self Service Portal (SSP)
  - Through healthcare.gov for licensed Assisters\*

\*Individuals can enroll themselves in Medicaid through Healthcare.gov

#### Using Self-service Portal (SSP) for Medicaid Redetermination:

#### Account Creation:

- DPHHS has instructions for account creation here: <u>SSP-Okta User Workflow (mt.gov)</u>
- To create an account on <a href="http://apply.mt.gov">http://apply.mt.gov</a> you must have an active email account that you have current access to in order to verify your account



- Click "Sign In/Create Account"
- DPHHS uses a multi-factor authentication system called Okta that manages login information for Montana.gov

## Earn too much for Medicaid?

Marketplace: Medicaid coverage loss Special Enrollment Period (SEP) from 3/31/2023 – 11/30/2024

 People who lost Medicaid during Unwinding can apply and enroll any time during that period

Increased federal subsidies continue to make plans more affordable

Special affordability provisions for enrolled members of federally recognized tribes

• Enrolled tribal members can qualify for additional savings, including \$0 deductibles and copayments up to 300% of FPL (\$60,000 annual income for a household of 2)

Qualified non-US citizens can enroll even if below income eligibility for Medicaid
